





Social Studies add a new intro course

U.S. History students visited the Indianapolis Museum of Art where they viewed oil painting, sculpture, and furniture from ancient times to contemporary times.

This year's Social Studies Department placed emphasis on ecology, law and society, war, youth subculture, and other similar problems of society. The students also developed an understanding of differing contributions. Visitors to classes included the Assistant Mayor and an officer on the Narcotics squad.

The department is headed by Mr. Richard Hedges. Two new teachers were added to the department; they were Mrs. Karen Mannweiler and Mr. Gerald Dailey. A new class, Introduction to Social Studies, was also added.

This was the first year for Zoology and Advanced Biology. They were taught by Mr. Randy Lamb and Mr. Robert Weaver and are offered to both juniors and seniors. A fall insect count was one of many class projects in Zoology.

Some permanent inhabitants were introduced to their new homes in the Zoology classroom. They included such friendly individuals as an alligator, a lizard, iguanas, tarantulas, and a spotted gecko. They were cared for by students from the various science classes.

General math new algebra option area


Almost three-fourths of the school takes math. General Math 3 and 4 is the new course added for students to select instead of Algebra.


Marshall again placed high in the Mathematical Association of America's contest given each year at Marshall. More math students also participated in other college sponsored contests around the state.






These scientific and technological principles learned can easily be applied to future work.

The Music Department is headed by Raymond Brandes who also directs the Orchestra.


















Varsity wins first place at state competition



Each of these groups sponsored soc-hops during the year to raise money for uniforms.







Leading the Patriots onto Sullivan Field is Mike Sipes. Closely following is the starting offensive team.









The six graduating seniors leave only Howard Bowling and Ronnie Mc-Bride from among the starters of the varsity team.







Frosh bring home City first, end season 5-2









Reading, human relations faculty goals

The city-wide emphasis on reading was reflected at John Marshall in the two-day in-service meetings, faculty meetings with reading specialists, and departmental workshops. Improved human relations, improved student and faculty attitudes, and the discovery of different teaching techniques were among the goals of the 110 faculty members.

The faculty, of whom 27 were new to JMHS, helped refine and direct curriculum under the leadership of Principal Thomas M. Haynes. One of the self-help programs begun this year was a tutorial program where students helped other students. Mrs. Jane Zerbo and Mrs. Nancy Saurini organized the program.

Faculty and students co-operated with the Purdue-Del Phi project sponsored by the human relations council. After the program participants defined what they considered to be problem areas at JMHS, the project members then proposed solutions to the problems through writing and through interviews.


